The formation of a fibrous cap can stabilize the plaque or make it more vulnerable to rupture, leading to thrombosis (clot formation) [3].

Plaque Rupture: Plaque rupture is a critical event in the pathogenesis of acute coronary syndromes. When a plaque ruptures, its contents are exposed to the bloodstream, leading to platelet activation and clot formation. Narrowing and Occlusion: As plaques grow and become more calcified, they can narrow the arteries, reducing blood flow. Severe narrowing or complete occlusion of a coronary artery can lead to myocardial infarction (heart attack). Heart Failure: A Multifactorial Condition Heart failure is a complex clinical syndrome characterized by the heart's inability to pump blood efficiently, leading to a decrease in cardiac output and inadequate tissue perfusion. While heart failure can result from various underlying conditions, such as CAD or hypertension, the following pathological insights are critical [4].

Pathological Insights: Myocardial Remodeling: In response to chronic stressors, such as high blood pressure or a prior heart attack, the heart undergoes structural changes known as myocardial remodeling. This includes hypertrophy (enlargement) of the heart muscle cells and fibrosis (scar tissue formation). Contractile Dysfunction: Myocardial remodeling can lead to contractile dysfunction, impairing the heart's ability to pump blood effectively. Reduced contractility is a hallmark of heart failure. Neurohormonal Activation: The body attempts to compensate for reduced cardiac output by activating neurohormonal pathways, including the reninangiotensin-aldosterone system (RAAS) and the sympathetic nervous system. While initially beneficial, chronic activation of these pathways can exacerbate heart failure [5].
